These foundations are affiliated with The Community Foundation under special provisions of Section 509(a) (1) of the Internal Revenue Code and are known as “supporting organizations.” Supporting organizations qualify as public charities because they exclusively support charitable programs that carry out the mission and purposes of The Community Foundation and because of their close operating relationship with the Foundation.

Two other entities are recognized in this section as program affiliates. The first is the Partnership for Nonprofit Leadership, which is an extension of TCF’s longstanding commitment to building the capacity of our local nonprofit sector. The second is the Barbara J. Thalhimer and William B. Thalhimer Jr. Family Fund, a former private foundation that terminated into a donor advised fund rather than a supporting organization.

Bill and Alice Goodwin have been involved in many of Richmond's most vital philanthropic and educational initiatives over the years. In addition, the Goodwins were inspired to take on another project after witnessing several friends and family members battle with cancer. Through a supporting organization established in 2002, the Commonwealth Foundation for Cancer Research, they have become proactive in helping to speed identification of a cure.

The Goodwins visited several cancer research and university-based medical centers throughout the country and consulted with experts to identify consistent funding gaps. Accordingly, they chose to initially fund several institutions that show promising results in helping to move potential treatments for cancer from the laboratory to human trials. The selected institutions include Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, Johns Hopkins Oncology Center, the University of Virginia Cancer Center and Virginia Commonwealth University's Massey Cancer Center, among others.

Garland & Agnes Taylor Gray Foundation

The Garland & Agnes Taylor Gray Foundation, named for the parents of former State Senator Elmon Gray, became a supporting organization in 1997. Garland Gray, who also served in the Virginia Senate, sponsored legislation during his 30-year tenure that requires the study of Virginia history in two grades in elementary schools. Consequently, the Gray family has traditionally supported cultural, historical and educational institutions, primarily in Southside Virginia.

A partnership with The Community Foundation has helped to bring order and expertise to the family's charitable giving, while maintaining a board structure that includes representatives from the current four branches of the Gray family. Continuing its focus on history, education and human services, the Gray Foundation now engages in both community and family advised grantmaking.

Partnership for Nonprofit Excellence

Fostering operating excellence in the local charitable sector has been part of The Community Foundation's grants portfolio for nearly 15 years. In 2006, TCF created the Partnership for Nonprofit Excellence in recognition of the fact that skill sets needed for effective and sustainable organizational development in the nonprofit sector are becoming increasingly complex.

The Partnership obtained independent 501(c)(3) status in 2008 and continues to integrate four successful programs in the Greater Richmond area—Connect Richmond, Consulting Solutions, HandsOn Greater Richmond and Nonprofit Learning Point. The Partnership forms a comprehensive resource for affordable and high-quality professional development, networking and training, civic engagement and access to resources critical to the success of Richmond's charitable and nonprofit network.

In 2010, the Partnership continued to provide much needed support, guidance and resources to help our region's nonprofit sector. HandsOn Greater Richmond facilitated over 13,000 volunteer hours through 398 organized projects, and received a Richmond History Makers Award for Demonstrating Innovative Solutions. Nonprofit Learning Point offered 61 courses in nonprofit management and graduated its third class of Emerging Nonprofit Leaders. ConnectRichmond received 7,900 unique monthly visitors to its website and engaged 6,600 individuals through email groups. The Partnership also participated in Consulting Solutions' organizational assessment process, which provided the necessary framework to develop a new set of strategic priorities to continue to deliver high-quality resources to the community.
