

YOUTH VIOLENCE PREVENTION INITIATIVE

The prevalence of violence is a major gauge of the health of any community, state or nation. For young people, interpersonal violence is a leading cause of injury and death among 15-24 year olds. Through a special grant initiative, the Jenkins Foundation provides support to the following agencies working to address youth violence. Grant amounts listed below represent the second year of three-year grant commitments.

Better Housing Coalition **\$38,550**

To support a Youth Violence Prevention Initiative at Winchester Greens.

Big Brothers Big Sisters Services Inc. **\$44,000**

To support site-based mentoring programs at Fairfield Court and Blackwell Elementary Schools.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Metro Richmond **\$60,000**

To support the "Gang Prevention Through Targeted Outreach" program in the Southwood and Fairfield Boys & Girls Club units.

YWCA of Richmond **\$37,000**

To support the "Raising Resilient Youth Initiative," which provides case management and counseling to youth exposed to violence.

The Foundation will also consider a limited number of proposals outside of the above-stated focus areas.

For nearly 15 years, the Jenkins Foundation has been steadfast in its commitment to improving the health of Greater Richmond. In pursuit of this mission, our board works closely with nonprofit partners to research current health trends, seek expert advice and explore best practices. Through strategic grantmaking, we help organizations address current needs and build a foundation for ongoing sustainability. Our primary focus areas continue to be improving access to health care for the uninsured, substance abuse prevention and violence prevention.
